Co-op Canadian Open takes place Nov. 5 to 10 at the Silent Ice Center in Nisku

Hurry hard to Nisku! If you're a curling fan, prepare yourself for five days of world-class curling during the Co-op Canadian Open. The Nov. 5 to 10 tournament is the second stop of the 2024-25 Grand Slam of Curling season and will feature 16 men's and women's teams from around the world.

The tournament will be held at the Silent Ice Center in Nisku. The Silent Ice Center – a state-of-the-art hockey arena – opened in September 2023 and has been a welcome addition to the Nisku Business Park, hosting multiple tournaments and bringing visitors to the region.

- Teaching and modelling appropriate routines.
- Helping participants establish a safe and supportive living environment.
- Connecting participants to appropriate resources.

Plowing through harvest – safely

Harvest season is upon us and is a busy time of year with increased activity on the fields, extra noise and more dust in the air. As a commuter on the roads within Leduc County, you know farmers are well into harvest. This is a busy time of year, and large farming equipment is often found travelling on road throughout the County.

Please read the following tips to help keep you safe through harvest.

Driver safety tips

- Large equipment is slow to move and difficult to maneuver; therefore, use caution when passing large farming equipment.
- Remember agricultural equipment can swing wide and is difficult to maneuver, so give ample space and be considerate when you see farmers turning or changing lanes.
- ► Given the large blind spots, they may not see you, so share the road and keep your distance.

Farmer safety tips

- Pay close attention to motorists and other vehicles.
- Use a slow-moving vehicle sign on your equipment to notify drivers.

- ► Ensure lights are working and use beacon lights when possible.
- Use escort vehicles both in front of and behind your equipment when traveling on busy roads or long distances.
- Make sure to look out for overhead power lines that could collide with equipment.

Please be patient and give our farmers the space they need to help them have a safe and productive harvest.

➤ To enhance community safety, Agricultural Area signs are being revamped throughout the region. Keep watch for them as they indicate areas with increased agricultural activity.

Smoke alarms: make them work for you

Fire Prevention Week is Oct. 6 to 12

This October, Leduc County Fire Services is teaming up with the **National Fire Protection Association® (NFPA®)** to promote this year's Fire Prevention Week (FPW) campaign, "Smoke alarms: Make them work for you!TM" The campaign works to educate everyone about the importance of having working smoke alarms in the home.

According to NFPA, smoke alarms reduce the risk of dying in a home fire by more than half (54 per cent). Meanwhile, roughly three out of five fire deaths happen in homes with either no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.

"Smoke alarms serve as the first line of defense in a home fire, but they need to be working in order to protect people," said Lorraine Carli, vice president of outreach and advocacy at NFPA. "This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign helps better educate the public about simple but critical steps they can take to make sure their homes have smoke alarms in all the needed locations and that they're working properly."

Leduc County Fire Services encourages all residents to actively support the 2024 FPW theme. "Working smoke alarms can make a life-saving difference in a home fire, giving people the time to get out safely," says Tylor Bennett, Acting Fire Chief with Leduc County. "This year's Fire Prevention Week campaign is a great way to remind everyone about these messages and to act on them."

Smoke alarm safety tips and guidelines

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each separate sleeping area (like a hallway), and on each level (including the basement) of the home.
- Make sure smoke alarms meet the needs of all family members, including those with sensory or physical disabilities.
- Test smoke alarms at least once a month by pushing the test button.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

Construction season nearing completion

This past spring and summer, several road construction projects took place throughout Leduc County. Work on most of the projects is complete and others are scheduled to be completed by the end of September.

Ongoing work may require detours or cause traffic delays; we thank you for your patience and cooperation as these road projects are completed. Here are details on some of the 2024 projects:

Township Road 510 realignment (finalizing project that started in 2023)

Budget: \$3,616,500

Original timeline: May 15 to July 15 Updated timeline: completed on

Sept. 15

- ▶ In 2023, Township Road 510 was realigned from Range Road 244 north to Range Road 243 north approximately 1.7 kilometres. The realignment is being done to prepare for a future four-lane roadway.
- The project scope also identified the construction of a multi-use path, bridge culvert, drainage improvements and landscaping.
- ➤ The bridge culvert was installed in 2023; however, the multi-use path, landscaping and drainage improvements will be completed in 2024.

Range Road 223 from Highway 21 to the New Sarepta hamlet boundary (1.2 km)

Budget: \$658,050

Timeline: Aug. 1 to 22; completed

on Aug. 23

The road surface was milled (two inches of the top layer of asphalt was removed to smooth and level the surface), crack and spot repairs were completed and new asphalt was installed.

Steinke Estates internal subdivision road (1.52 km)

Budget: \$1,052,970 Timeline: June 10 to July 26; completed on Aug. 2

The purpose of this project was to convert the existing cold-mix road into an asphalt surface. Construction work included subgrade widening (expanding the base layer to accommodate a wider surface) and cement stabilizing (incorporating cement powder into the subgrade to increase its strength) followed by a layer of gravel for the base of the road. Afterwards, the road was finished with a new asphalt surface.

8A Street, Nisku from 7 Street to 8 Street (0.89 km)

Budget: \$711,950 Original timeline: July 29 to Aug. 13 Updated timeline: project rescheduled to begin on Sept. 9

➤ The purpose of this project is to upgrade the current asphalt surface. Work will include milling (removing some of the top layer of asphalt to smooth and level the surface) and repairing the existing surface and replacing it with a new layer of asphalt.

41 Avenue and Nisku Spine Road: construction of a second left turn lane (northbound)

Budget: \$318,000 Original timeline: June 3 to 25 Updated timeline: completed on July 24

A second left-turn lane for northbound traffic was constructed at the intersection of 41 Avenue and Nisku Spine Road.

Nisku Spine Road from Allard Avenue to 65 Avenue (1.3 km)

Budget: \$2,000,000 (50 per cent cost share with the City of Leduc; City of Leduc is managing the project)

Timeline: May 15 to Sept. 30 (weather dependent)

➤ The purpose of this project is to construct two lanes of Nisku Spine Road from Allard Avenue, Leduc, to Township Road 500 (65 Avenue, Leduc).

Rural Roads Initiative wrapping up for the season

Every summer, multiple sections of gravel roads throughout Leduc County undergo various improvements as part of the County's Rural Roads Initiative (RRI). The Rural Roads Initiative began in 2018 and runs annually each summer. A total of \$1.125 million was budgeted for this program in the 2024 budget.

The roads in the program are identified as those most in need of improvement, and work is completed by both contractors and Leduc County employees. The projects completed through the RRI improve road conditions and lengthen the lifecycle of the road.



Before: Shoulder pull and soft spot repair at Township Road 500 between Range Road 245 and Range Road 250

Work completed in this year's RRI included:

- ▶ 8.4 kilometres of shoulder pulls, which included narrowing the driving surface, cleaning up ditches and stabilizing roads.
- 850 metres of bank stabilization, which included cleaning up and re-establishing ditches and stabilizing road shoulders.
- ▶ 850 metres of spot repair, which included excavating soft spot/organic materials, adding concrete and re-gravelling.
- ▶ 1.1 kilometres of drainage work, which included cleaning up and re-establishing ditches for better drainage.

▶ 4.8 kilometres of road rehabilitation, which included shaping and stabilizing the road.

- ► Township Road 503 east of Joseph Lake Road to Wildland Meadows
 - ≥ 2.45 km of shoulder pull

- Range Road 262 between Township Road 494 and Township Road 492
 - ▶ 300 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 254 south of Township Road 482
 - 197 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 255 south of Township Road 492
 - 98 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 235 South of Highway 625
 - ▶ 85 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 260 north of Township Road 492
 - ▶ 160 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 234 north of Township Road 500
 - ≥ 280 m soft spot repair
- Range Road 253 north of Township Road 492
 - ▶ 180 m soft spot repair

- Range Road 230 north of Highway 623
 - ▶ 161m soft spot repair
- Township Road 492 east of Range Road 245

Winter driving is right around the corner

Below-freezing temperatures coupled with snow and ice can create dangerous driving conditions; and with winter driving ahead, here's some tips to help keep you and your passengers safe.

Winterize your vehicle

Ensure your vehicle is ready for freezing temperatures and slippery conditions.

- Examine your spare tire, battery, belts, hoses, anti-freeze, tires, heater, defroster and windshield wipers.
- Switch to winter tires. They are specially designed for lower temperatures and provide better traction than all-season tires.
- Clear snow and ice off windows, side mirrors, headlights, taillights and licence plate before driving.

- Try to keep your fuel tank more than half full. This adds weight, reduces moisture problems in your fuel system and can be an asset if you become stranded.
- Carry an emergency road kit with items such as booster cables, flashlight, first aid kit, shovel, hand and foot warmers and a blanket.



A (n)ice thing about Warburg arena

The arena in Warburg has been a central hub in the community for various activities throughout the years, however, needed some important upgrades. The Village of Warburg saw this need, took action and in partnership with Leduc County has been redeveloping the arena through the past few years.

In 2019, phase one kicked off and included new dressing rooms. For phase two in 2022, the Village secured \$1 million in provincial grant funding, provided \$500,000 and received \$1.33 million from Leduc County, which is consistent with the County's recreation cost-sharing agreement that supports residents in accessing various activities and programs.

If passing through Warburg this year, you may have noticed the construction of these upgrades, which included a new ice plant and Zamboni room in addition to the dressing rooms, all of which have greatly improved the facility overall.

Aimed to reduce future operating, capital, and maintenance costs, the new ice plant will support ice operations of both the arena and the curling rink.

These updates are a true testament to how collaboration and working together can make a difference in our community. Congratulations on the improved facility and a job well done by everyone involved.

Ditch maintenance reminders

Did you know ditch maintenance is Leduc County's responsibility? The typical County right-of-way is 66 feet, and we do our best to manage all ditches so water flows appropriately and culverts remain clear.

This coming fall and winter, keep the following reminders in mind when working near ditches.

- ▶ Keep ditches clear of gravel. Gravel is expensive to replace and can also create drainage issues in culverts.
- ▶ Do not push snow from your driveway into ditches. Snow can cause drainage issues such as blocked culverts and runoff over roads and onto farmer's fields.

- Create and share a found pet posting on a Facebook groups like Lost/Found Pets in Leduc and Surrounding Areas or Lost Pets Leduc Area.

What to do if you have a LOST a dog:

- Look around your property/subdivision.
- Ask neighbours if they have seen your dog, if not, provide details on what it looks like and leave a contact number.
- ➤ Call **780-955-5005** to see if your dog has been dropped off or found by Bylaw Enforcement.
- Check on and post details about your dog and contact information on Facebook groups like Lost/Found Pets in Leduc and Surrounding Areas or Lost Pets Leduc Area.
- Continue to follow these steps, as new information may come up.
