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Construction season underway

This spring and summer, several road construction projects are taking place throughout Leduc County.

Some of the projects may require detours or cause traffic delays; we thank you for your patience and cooperation as these road projects are completed.

Township Road 510 realignment (finalizing project that started in 2023)

Budget: \$3,616,509

Timeline: May 15 to July 15 (weather dependent)

▶ In 2023, Township Road 510 was realigned from Range Road 244 north to Range Road 243 north — roughly 1.7 km. The realignment is being done to prepare for a future four-lane roadway.

- The project scope also identified the construction of a multi-use path, bridge culvert, drainage improvements and landscaping.
- ► The bridge culvert was installed in 2023; however, the multi-use path, landscaping and drainage improvements will be completed in 2024.

Range Road 223 from Highway 21 to the New Sarepta hamlet boundary (1.2 km)

Budget: \$658,050

Timeline: Aug. 1 to 22 (weather dependent)

➤ The purpose of this project is to mill (remove some of the top layer of asphalt to smooth and level the surface) the existing asphalt and replace with a new layer of asphalt. Construction work will include milling the existing surface down by two inches, completing crack and spot repairs and laying down new asphalt.

Steinke Estates internal subdivision road (1.52 km)

Budget: \$1,052,970

Timeline: June 10 to July 26 (weather dependent)

► The purpose of this project is to convert the existing cold-mix road into an asphalt surface. Construction work will include subgrade widening (expanding the base layer to accommodate a wider surface) and cement stabilizing (incorporating cement powder into the subgrade to increase its strength) followed by a layer of gravel for the base of the road. Afterwards, the road will be finished with a new asphalt surface.

8A Street, Nisku from 7 Street to 8 Street (0.89 km)

Budget: \$711,950

Timeline: July 29 to Aug. 13 (weather dependent)

➤ The purpose of this project is to upgrade the current asphalt surface. Work will include milling (remove some of the top layer of asphalt to smooth and level the surface) and repairing the existing surface and replacing it with a new layer of asphalt.

41 Avenue and Nisku Spine Road: construction of a second left turn lane (northbound)

Budget: \$318,370

Timeline: June 3 to 25 (weather dependent)

➤ The purpose of this project is to construct a second left-turn lane for northbound traffic at the intersection of 41 Avenue and Nisku Spine Road.

Nisku Spine Road from Allard Avenue to 65 Avenue (1.3 km)

Budget: \$2 million (50 per cent cost share with the City of Leduc; City of Leduc is managing the project)

Timeline: May 15 to Sept. 30 (weather dependent)

► The purpose of this project is to construct two lanes of Nisku Spine Road from Allard Avenue to 65 Avenue.

Message from Council

On April 23, Council approved the \$101.2-million operating and \$24.4-million capital budgets to support program and service delivery for 2024, and with this budget, we were able to maintain our 2023 tax rates for another year.

As a Council, we are mindful of how important creating a balanced budget is that doesn't put undue stress on our citizens. We know we are using our citizens' hard-earned money to maintain a healthy and thriving community that is set up for future growth and success.

Being able to maintain our competitive tax rates year over year while also providing exceptional service to our citizens is something we are proud of. Providing competitive tax rates is also one of the reasons why we are experiencing growth and development in our industrial sectors.

In 2023, Leduc County experienced a 6.95 per cent increase in overall assessment, which was preceded by a 7.24 per cent increase in 2022. This increase in assessment is one of the reasons why we were able to maintain our 2023 tax rates for 2024.

Maintaining this growth is one of Leduc County's priorities, and we are working hard to continue this upward trend in several ways, such as through infrastructure investments, provincial and federal grant funding opportunities and developing new relationships with businesses through our economic development team.

2024 TAX BREAKDOWN


For 2024 Council approved a \$101.2-million **operating budget**, which covers day-to-day municipal operating expenses and includes \$28.9 million collected on behalf of the Government of Alberta and the Leduc Regional Housing Foundation for school, designated industrial property and seniors' housing requisitions. They also approved a \$24.4-million **capital budget**, which includes infrastructure costs for buildings, roads, bridges and equipment.

Between 2023 and 2024, Leduc County experienced notable growth in our overall assessment. Taxable assessment values grew from \$9.24 billion to \$9.86 billion, or 6.71 per cent. This growth provides the County with roughly \$3.5 million in additional tax dollars for 2024. Taking into account these additional tax dollars, no change to our tax rates are needed to meet our budget requirements for 2024. This allows the County to continue providing the high-quality services our citizens and businesses expect.

Your assessment is a reflection of your property's market value as of July 1, 2023

Understanding your assessment

In Alberta, residential and most commercial properties are assessed at market value. Your property assessment is a reflection of your property's market value as of **July 1, 2023** and its physical condition as of Dec. 31, 2023.

A valuation date ensures all properties in a municipality are valued as of the same date. The valuation date is set by legislation from the *Municipal Government Act*.

To determine the property assessment, Leduc County's assessment department gathered data from all properties that sold between July 1, 2022 and July 1, 2023.

Municipal property taxes fund services such as:

- · agricultural services
- family and community support services
- · parks and recreation services
- planning and development services
- protective services (fire and enforcement)
- revenue sharing with the City of Leduc for property taxes collected from Edmonton International Airport (YEG) properties
- · road maintenance

Requisitions

Each year, Leduc County collects tax dollars on behalf of the **Government of Alberta** and the **Leduc Regional Housing Foundation**. These funds are called requisitions.

Leduc County has no control over this amount and is obligated to collect taxes on behalf of the these organizations.

Citizen Satisfaction Survey — your feedback in action

In the September 2023 issue of the County Chronicle, we shared that Citizen Satisfaction Survey results* would be incorporated into Leduc County's operations.

Each year, every Leduc County department creates an operational plan to help guide their work throughout the year.

This year, every department has committed to increasing citizen satisfaction with Leduc County's

municipal services and have incorporated actions in their operational plans in response to the feedback received in the 2023 Citizen Satisfaction Survey.

In April, each department reported back on activities undertaken from January to March 2024, including on those activities that are tied to increasing citizen satisfaction. Highlights from the first quarter (January to March) include the following:

Taking care of our seniors and their well-being

World Elder Abuse Awareness Day is Saturday, June 15, 2024 — a day to help bring awareness to the importance of preventing elder abuse, the struggles some of our senior community members experience and to help identify and combat elder abuse.

The Government of Alberta's elder abuse prevention strategy defines elder abuse as any intentional or reckless act or wilful and negligent disregard, occurring within a relationship of family, trust or dependency, directed at someone 65 years of age or older, that:

- Causes physical, emotional or psychological harm.
- Involves the misappropriation or misuse of money or other personal possessions or personal or real property.
- Subjects an individual to non-consensual sexual contact, activity or behaviour.
- Fails to provide the necessities of life.

Elder abuse is often committed by someone known to the victim, such as a family member, friend or caregiver. To note, emotional and financial abuse are the most frequently reported forms of elder abuse.

Some common signs of elder abuse:

- confusion
- depression or anxiety
- unexplained injuries
- changes in hygiene
- seeming fearful around certain people
- fear or worry when talking about money

It can happen to anyone and to a person of any age. Leduc County Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) is here to support anyone who may be experiencing abuse, stress or is struggling with mental health.

Making space for our farmers

Leduc County would like to remind residents, commuters and visitors that this is an agricultural community and until winter settles in, farmers are busy cultivating, seeding, spraying and harvesting their cropland.

Farmers are an essential part of our community and can be found in large equipment on gravel roads and secondary highways moving from field-to-field. We ask you give them the space they need to maneuver and be patient as large equipment can be slow to move, have large blind spot areas and swing wide to make turns.

Tips for driving and sharing the road with farm equipment:

- ▶ Be alert and watch for slow-moving farm equipment and any alert flags, signs or flashing lights, as they are an indicator of the equipment.
- ▶ Keep your distance and stay alert, as large trucks and other agricultural equipment need to make wide turns onto and off of fields.
- Do not pass until you are certain there is no oncoming traffic and the operator is aware of your intention.
- ▶ Before passing, ensure there is no one approaching behind you and trying to pass before you do.
- Watch for uncontrolled intersections and oncoming traffic.

Together, we can support our farmers and make our roads safer to travel on.

Automatic payment option available for utility customers

Leduc County offers utility customers various bill payment options. One of the more convenient options is automatic payments, also called direct withdrawals.

How does this work?

Visit leduc-county.com/water-and-sewer to complete the form online or download a PDF form.

- ▶ The form is for pre-authorized debit and needs to be submitted by the 20th of the month.
- Include a void cheque or pre-authorized debit form from your bank with your submission.
- ▶ The amount due per your utility bill will be automatically withdrawn from your bank account on the due date of the utility bill.
- ▶ All past due balances must be paid to begin direct withdrawals.

Automatic payments can be cancelled at any time with two weeks written notice.

Secure your cargo for safer travels

Securing your load leads to safer travels, minimizes the risk to other motorists and prevents cargo from littering ditches and roadways in our community. So, when do you need to secure your cargo? Whenever you're hauling loose items heavy or light, near or far.

Drivers are responsible for making sure their cargo is secured to their vehicle and failing to do so can result in a fine. Further, if you lose your load and don't retrieve it, tax dollars must be spent to clean up the litter, which costs us all money.

▶ "Not securing cargo to your vehicle during transport jeopardizes the lives and safety of other motorists and can litter our community. Please take a few minutes to ensure the cargo you are transporting is properly secured to protect the public and prevent any fines."

Tips for securing your cargo:

- Use appropriate tie-down straps to properly secure objects (not bungie cords).
- Place light objects lower in the container to prevent them from flying or falling out.
- Securely fasten all large items, like mattresses and construction equipment, directly to your vehicle with appropriate tie-down straps.
- Put loose items, like garbage and yard waste, in a covered container so they are easier to secure and to prevent contents from blowing away.
- Run straps through and around items to help secure them safely down.
- Place a tarp, straps or cargo nets over loose items to ensure they don't fall from your vehicle.
- While travelling, check your cargo regularly to ensure nothing has slid or fallen out.

Regulations

Failing to secure cargo when travelling on a local County roadway (excluding provincial roadways) could result in a \$486 fine. Commercial vehicle operators could also face an \$810 fine under the *Traffic Safety Act* for failing to secure their cargo.

If a vehicle tracks earth, sand, gravel or other material – including vehicle fluids – onto a roadway, the vehicle operator may be required to remove it or may be charged related clean-up fees. If there is any damage to the roadway, the vehicle operator may be charged related fees to repair the damage.

If your cargo becomes unsecured and falls onto the road, take reasonable steps to safely remove it. If you are unable to do so, contact Leduc County Enforcement Services at **780-955-5005**.

Seniors assisted transportation subsidy program rolling right along

The cost of getting to and from appointments can be a barrier for many of our rural senior citizens, so last fall Leduc County launched a pilot program in partnership with Drive Happiness Association. This program was developed to subsidize transportation services to help our seniors maintain an independent lifestyle.

Leduc County believes rural residents should have the resources to age-in-place and aims to support older adults access needed services. In the first eight months of the program:

- 21 riders were registered
- 24 round trip rides were provided

Eligibility

This service is available to seniors residing in Leduc County, Town of Calmar, Town of Thorsby and Village of Warburg. Eligible seniors must be over the age of 65 and be sufficiently mobile, such as entering and exiting vehicles on their own. There are no income restrictions.

Those aged 65 to 79 years may access up to five free round-trip rides per year for medical appointments. Those aged 80 and older may access up to 10 free round-trip rides per year for social, basic or medical reasons. Additional rides can be accessed at a reasonable cost.

Weeding out the (ob)noxious

Weeds are not only a nuisance in our backyards, flower beds and gardens, but they also present a significant threat to agricultural lands by taking over seeded crops and to the environment by affecting native vegetation. To keep certain invasive species under control, Leduc County works with residents to manage weeds on both private and public lands.

Alberta's Weed Control Act is the guiding legislation in declaring noxious or prohibited noxious weeds that present significant economic, social or ecological risks throughout the province. Under these regulations, weeds declared as noxious or prohibited noxious must be controlled or destroyed.

By identifying and controlling weeds early, it's easier to limit their damaging effects. Leduc County Agricultural Services can assist with weed identification and work with you to develop an effective control plan.

Noxious weeds can spread rapidly causing severe crop losses and economic hardship. Under the *Weed Control Act*, residents are responsible for controlling the spread of noxious weeds by mowing, cutting frequently or spraying.

Examples of noxious weeds include:

- Dame's rocket
- Yellow toadflax
- Ox-eye daisy
- White cockle

Prohibited noxious weeds pose a serious threat as they spread rapidly and are highly competitive for space and nutrients against other plants. Under the *Weed Control Act*, prohibited noxious weeds must be destroyed by either pulling, cultivating or spraying with a selective herbicide.

Examples of prohibited noxious weeds include:

- ► Purple loosestrife
- Orange hawkweed
- Knotweed
- Himalayan balsam

NEW Transfer station access cards

Leduc County residents can anticipate their new transfer station access card hitting their mailbox this summer.

Transfer station access cards are required when utilizing any one of the eight facilities found throughout the County. One card is provided to each Leduc County property that contains a residence. Should a property contain more than one home, each would be eligible for an access card. Cards issued next month will have an expiry of Aug. 31, 2026. Current pink cards can be used until **Aug. 31, 2024.**

Please note, these cards aren't intended for commercial, industrial, agricultural or institutional use.

Uncontrolled rural intersection safety

Intersections in rural areas can be unmarked and uncontrolled; therefore, Leduc County wants to remind travelers of the rules while approaching and passing through them. Uncontrolled intersections have no traffic signs or signal lights and may also apply to an intersection commonly referred to as a "T" intersection.

Other drivers may not be expecting traffic to cross their path at an uncontrolled intersection, so be sure to check for vehicles and farm equipment approaching from your left and right — slow down and yield to the right-of-way — (the vehicle to your right) and be prepared to stop.

Tips to stay safe while driving through uncontrolled intersections

- Slow down and look before proceeding watch for other vehicles, farm equipment, and pedestrians.
- ► Ensure it is safe to turn left or right by checking for oncoming traffic before turning.
- Leave ample room between your vehicle and the one in front of you, as this not only avoids a collision, but also avoids rocks chipping your windshield.
- ▶ Be prepared for the unexpected and drive carefully.

Road conditions can be unpredictable and lighting on roads varies, so always use caution when approaching uncontrolled intersections, stay alert and share the road accordingly. Let's all get home safely.



Rural Roads Initiative underway

Every summer, multiple sections of gravel roads throughout Leduc County undergo various improvements as part of the County's Rural Roads Initiative

The roads in the program are identified as those most in need of improvement, and a lot of the projects tied to this program are already well underway.

Projects in this year's program include:

- 8.4 km of shoulder pulls
- ▶ 850 m of bank stabilization
- ▶ 850 m of spot repair
- ▶ 1.1 km of drainage work
- 4.8 km of road rehabilitation

The Rural Roads Initiative began in 2018 and runs annually each summer. A total of \$1.125 million is budgeted towards this program in the 2024 budget.

About Leduc County campgrounds

- ▶ Jubilee Park Campground is located 15 minutes south of Calmar on Wizard Lake. There are powered sites, non-powered sites and comfort cabins. Amenities include a concession, playground, hiking trails, swimming area, boat launch, sani-dump and showers.
 - Jubilee Park Campground has a day-use area for those who wish to come and spend the day enjoying the lake and beach area.
 - Day-use area parking is free Mondays through Thursdays, excluding statutory holidays. Paid parking is in effect on weekends, including Fridays and statutory holidays, at \$8 per day or \$40 for a season pass.



Group camping

- Sunnybrook Creek Park Group Campground is located along Highway 39 west of Sunnybrook. There are six campsites with individual firepits, a picnic shelter, a central group firepit, double vault toilets and a water hand pump (nonpotable water).
- ▶ Genesee Park Group Campground is located at 3053 Township Road 510A immediately west of Genesee Heritage Park. There are nine campsites with individual firepits, a picnic shelter, a central group firepit, double vault toilets, a walking path adjacent to Genesee Heritage Park and a water hand pump (non-potable water).

Seas the day with boat safety

Hot weather brings summer fun and what better way than to be out on the water. Boating is a popular way to spend a day at Leduc County's favoured spots — Wizard Lake and Pigeon Lake. If you're planning to spend a day on the water, take precautions. The following outlines some safety tips, whether you're new to boating or have sailed through a few seasons.

- ▶ Wear a lifejacket or personal flotation device (PFD): Transport Canada requires a lifejacket or PFD be on board for each person, including human-powered and motorized watercrafts. Choose a brightly coloured life jacket, such as red, orange or yellow to be more visible when in the water.
- Operate at safe speeds: take into consideration the weather, visibility and maneuverability of your boat. Be mindful of your boat's wake and the impact it may have on other water users.
- ▶ Stay alert to the conditions: temperature and weather conditions can quickly change and being alert allows for quick response.
- ► Carry required safety devices: you should have a bailer or manual water pump, watertight flashlight, flares, paddles, sound-signaling device and buoyant heaving line.
- ▶ **Boat sober:** impaired driving whether on roadways or waterways is illegal. Operators face the same penalties operating a boat while impaired as driving a vehicle. Passengers aboard a boat may consume alcohol, as long as that boat is licensed for alcohol consumption, or has a permanent toilet, cooking facilities, sleeping facilities and is anchored or docked.
