

FIRE PREVENTION TIP SHEET HARVEST FIRE SAFETY

During harvest, there can be a lot on your mind. One topic to keep top of mind is fire safety — doing so could save you and your livelihood.

High winds and dry conditions make for potentially dangerous fire situations.

Tips to prevent field and combine fires

Once a fire starts, it has the potential to spread quickly and become a danger to you and your property and those around you. The below tips will help prevent field and combine fires:

- During the day, walk around machinery and watch, listen and smell to check everything is in good working order.
- Ensure bearings and drives are lubricated and adjust tension as needed.
- Check exposed wiring for damage, wear and deterioration.
- Remove straw, chaff and other crop residues, dust, debris, dirt and excess lubricant around all heat sources regularly.
- Allow engine to cool before refuelling farm equipment.
- Take precautionary measures when using low-clearance vehicles in fields, as exhaust pipes and catalytic converters can ignite dry grass or stubble.
- Clean or blow off chaff and straw from the radiator and air-intake vents regularly to prevent engine overheating or fires elsewhere on the combine.
- Mow your grass short in the fall to prevent the spread of wildfire in late fall/early winter before adequate snow cover.
- ▶ Before storing your equipment for the season, make a pass or two around your yard and feed storage areas to slow the spread of fire, if one occurs.

Essential safety tips

► Have a fire extinguishers mounted on equipment and ensure everyone is trained to use it. We recommend having a fire extinguisher in the cab and another one accessible from the ground.

- Always have a charged cell phone with you so you can call 9-1-1 for help if needed. We recommend also having your neighbour's phone numbers programmed in your phone so you can call for help or alert them to a fire threatening their properties.
- Carry equipment with you that can help put out or reduce the spread of a fire. This includes a shovel, a tillage implement and several gallons of water. If possible, have a tractor available and/or a water truck or trailer with a pump and hose.
