Municipal Policy

LM-01 – Undeveloped Road Allowance Assessment and Land Management Services Land Management

Policy statement

Leduc County recognizes the importance of the long-term preservation of the transportation network.

This policy provides guidance on the use of undeveloped road allowances (URA) in the County.

Definitions

Adjacent Land means land that is next to or adjoining to the URA.

Administration means the staff of Leduc County under the direction of the county manager.

Council means the duly elected council of Leduc County.

County means the municipal district of Leduc County in the Province of Alberta.

County Chronicle means the monthly newsletter distributed to County residents and businesses.

License to Occupy (LTO) is an agreement between the County and the interested party in which temporary use of an undeveloped road allowance is granted for a specified term.

Undeveloped road allowance (URA) is any land laid out for roads by a Crown surveyor (Province of Alberta) that has not been fully developed or not yet required for vehicular traffic. Undeveloped road allowances are a part of the road grid system of Alberta, with undeveloped road allowances being placed every two miles North to South and one mile East to West.

Licensee means a person to whom a license is granted or issued.

Policy authority

Legislative implications:

- Traffic Safety Act S.13(1)(o)

Policy standards

- 1. Leduc County's preferred manner to allow use of a URA is through a license to occupy (LTO).
- 2. A license to occupy a URA will only be granted to adjacent landowners.
- 3. Leduc County will only support the closure, sale and consolidation of a URA to an adjacent landowner in very specific circumstances, such as when:
 - The road does not have any current or future impact on the County's road network.
 - It increases land efficiency and promotes effective planning and development as determined by Leduc County.
 - A structural encroachment exists that is difficult to move (i.e. residence with a basement).
 - It restricts access to highly disruptive pedestrian areas where there is chronic issue of multiperson gatherings where trash and other biological hazards damage the allowance.
- 4. The closure and sale of a URA will be advertised within the County Chronicle.

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5. All inquiries about obtaining a license to occupy or the closure and sale of a road allowance shall be directed to Leduc County's Assessment and Land Management Services department.

Policy responsibilities

Council responsibilities:

Council will,

- Review and approve this policy.
- Approve any road closure requests before submission to Alberta Transportation.

Administration responsibilities:

Administration will,

- Adhere to this policy when processing requests involving undeveloped road allowances.
- Develop administrative directives and procedures to support this policy.

Monitoring and updating

- This policy will be posted on Leduc County's website.
- This policy will be reviewed at least once every four years.
